## **OBJECTIVES**

- Artist will use mixed media fabric/fibers to create a quilt piece.
- Artist will tap into personal experience to create a piece of art that reflects them.
- Artist will relax and enjoy and make a piece of art for arts sake.

## CONCEPT

Inspired by the figurative beauty of the Hodler women and the whimsical doll from the Sudan the artist will create a small quilt piece. Understanding the creative process and how an artist can take a situation, conversation or event in their own life to create a piece of art.

## **MATERIALS/PROCEDUE**

Fabric Embellishments
Quilt Batting Shrinky Dinks
Needles Toaster oven
Embroidery Floss Scissors permanent markers
Iron Beading needles
Beads NYMO floss

Think of a conversation you had recently, look around the Art Museum, pick a piece you love, pick a piece that bugs you. Did you go to a dress shop and get ignored by the sales person. Did you burn your Lean Cuisine? Any of these" prompts" can spark you creative juices and get you thinking. Grab a scrap paper and write, sketch or scribble your thoughts. Figurative is nice, that is why I selected the Hodler piece to look at and of course The Doll.



Cut a small piece of any fabric, around 6"x 6", cut a piece of batting-same size and cut one more piece of any fabric for the backing. Those three pieces will be your first quilt sandwich. Sew around all 4 edges; I call this the over-under stitch. Change floss whenever you need to.

Next, cut out a white piece of fabric for the face-sew around with black floss and draw in the facial features with the black floss. Start "painting" the flesh tones of the face with your floss.

Next cut out the body parts and sew around. Add clothes, background, whatever you need to tell your tale.

Here is the order, which is important to remember:

- 1. Quilt sandwich square
- 2. Large appliqué pieces
- 3. Small appliqué pieces
- 4. Written words
- 5. Susie Shie chicken scratch
- 6. Small beads
- 7. Big beads and charms and Shrinky Dinks.
- 8. Small pieces can be hung by a "D" hook
- 9. Bigger pieces will need a sleeve and a dowel rod to hang
